Americanism 3rd District Year End Report 2023-2024 Tamara Thayer, Chair

Department Chair Mary Kuperus states the purpose of the national Americanism program is to promote patriotism and responsible citizenship. The work of the Americanism program is educationally based and divided into *three phases*: work with youth, work with adults, and work within the community. All matters about the flag or patriotic education are rightly classified as Americanism activities.

The 3rd District Americanism program had 17 Units reporting, a *few* examples follow:

<u>Work with Youth</u>: Third District is in their 2nd year of the Americanism Essay Contest. 49 students in Elysian had an Americanism field trip to the Legion where they learned about the flag, & military service and to the memorial where the

different flags, statues and pavers were described. Faribault students received the cords and their parents received the Blue Star Banner. Poppy Poster Contests, and Poppy Coloring Contests were held by most of the units, with Faribault having the winners ride in the Memorial Day Parade. Shakopee lays a wreath at each cemetery while the flag is raised and lowered, and Taps is played. A natural wreath is thrown into the river in honor of those lost at sea. Shakopee presented their Good Citizen Awards to 6 boys and 6 girls from each of 3 schools with 8th graders and two from high school. Purple Up! Activities honoring military kids was celebrated. All military children ate free at the omelet breakfast in April. Many units reported the "Star Spangled Kids" program was promoted by educating our youth about US history, Americanism, and the US Constitution. A class of home-schooled American Sign Language students learned how to sign the National Anthem and the pledge on the National Anthem Day. One unit started working on the Junior Americanism patch.

<u>Work with Adults</u>: Norwood went to 5 places to present a citizenship lesson with facts and history of the flag. Faribault participates with the Hometown Hero Banners, Frontline Ceremony, Operation 23 to 0, and a 23-hour vigil prior to Veterans Day. To celebrate Veterans Day; Bayport put on a veteran's dinner, many units gave gifts to veterans, and some invited veterans to be part of the Veterans Day Programs. Chaska participated in the Wreaths Across America and laid wreaths at Fort Snelling National Cemetery.

<u>Work within the Community</u>: Several auxiliary members from different units were guest speakers to a variety of adult groups in the community. Elysian partnered with FFA on a fundraiser. Norwood participated in the Artisan Fair Valentine's party. Lester Prairie worked a fund raiser at the citywide garage sale days. Faribault sponsored a Christmas Market. Elysian worked on many 4th of July community events. Stewert and Elysian donated to a local Girls Scout troop. Shakopee held a breakfast with Santa and Halloween bingo. Belle Plaine helps with 8 different holiday events for the community. St Paul Park participated in the Civil War Hero Dedication. Hutchinson participated in a bloodmobile, and gave flag pins for the Good deed awardees, essay entries, and at the kids game.

<u>Flag Promotion and Protection</u>: Four of the Units reported a Flag Disposal Ceremony. Small flags were used for classroom prizes, and they were distributed during parades. Many Units held a Flag Poster contest. The flag was displayed at all Auxiliary meetings. ALA grave markers with USA Flags were placed at the gravesites for Memorial Day. A USA Flag was given to foreign exchange students. Kelly Kauss carried the American flag for the 3rd District at Department convention.

<u>Americanism/Patriotism:</u> Units recited the Pledge of Allegiance and the Preamble of the ALA Constitution at all meetings. Trivia questions on Americanism, Patriotism, and the flag was played at Americanism classes with prizes like a copy of the American Constitution, Flag Etiquette, a small flag etc. Chaska arranged for Richard Middleton to bring in several authentic flags and give the history of each flag.

<u>Veterans/Military Family:</u> Military who die by suicide are remembered with a 23-hour vigil prior to the Veterans Day Ceremony. 23 long-stemmed red roses are put in combat boots placed in a circle at their Veterans Memorial. "Operation Green Light" encourages homes to shine a green light to show their support for Veterans the week of Veterans Day. Karen Rassmussen spoke on "The History of the American Flag" on Veteran Day. Most of the units reporting described wonderful Veterans Day programs and activities they provided as well as detailed Memorial Day celebrations.

Branding: Members from most units' report wearing uniforms at public events to promote the Auxiliary.

<u>Summary</u>: Just over 1/3 of the 3rd District 46 units sent in their Americanism reports. From those, 8 participated in Americanism school programs. There were 16 flag education programs given. 3,771 flags were distributed not counting the numerous ones handed out in parades. There were 18 Veterans Day programs or events on Veterans Day. There were 38 Memorial Day programs and services given. Units participated in 42 other Holiday or community events where members were wearing ALA branding while serving the community. Units participated in youth programs such as the National Essay contest, Girl Scouts, Junior Activities, Poppy Poster contest, Poppy Coloring Contest, Flag Poster Contest, Girls State, and delivered gifts to veterans with the Juniors. Units participated in the American Legion Baseball, SAL programs, and Blue Star Banner Program. 1,018 flags were presented to schools or organizations using 49 volunteer hours.

The totals from the 17 Units reporting on Americanism are:

Total number of hours volunteered= 1,022

Total money donated/spent= \$5,340.24

<u>3rd District Americanism Awards '23-'24</u>: 5 judges representing 4 Units evaluated the essay contest. 4 people not competing, judged the other 2 awards. Tamara did not judge since her unit was competing.

Education Report 3rd District Year End Report Karen Rasmussen 2023-2024

Of 46 units in Minnesota's 3rd District, 17 sent an education report with five reporting that they did not participate. From the financial data in the 12 reports, \$14,772 was the amount units dedicated to schools, staff, and students in some way, including grants of \$9200. Education is very important to our District's units.

April 15th is Purple Up Day. One unit purchased 28 purple T-shirts for military children plus gave them pencils. Students wearing purple, red, white, or blue got a treat. One class was 100% purple, so they were featured in the newspaper and on Facebook. Seven students received Good Citizen Awards in three schools. Ten graduating seniors in two schools entering the military received military honor cords to wear at graduation and one unit also gave parents a Blue Star Banner; a Girls Stater received a gold Girls State sash. Third graders in one school had a field trip to the American Legion and toured two memorials. One unit did a Youth Coloring Contest and blue, red, or white ribbons were given to the top three students in grades 1-5 from 100 entries. Top winners also received a flag, a medal on a lanyard and rode in the Memorial Day Parade as did the Poppy Poster Contest winner. Three students entered the Americanism Essay Contest winning both unit and district awards, and one received the first place Dept award. One unit had a student compete in the AL Oratorical Contest. Prizes for various unit level contests were all \$25 for the winners totaling \$325. Three students attended Girl State from two units, and one sponsored a student to Legionville Safety Camp.

Nine units gave local scholarships, including two units' Past Presidents Parley, for a total of \$2300. A template was found online for awarding an auxiliary scholarship. Donations were made to the Dept of MN Scholarship (\$200), and the American Legion Legacy Scholarship (\$400). Four students applied for either Dept or National Scholarships.

Units provided education in classrooms. One unit visited nine classrooms in three schools and gave lessons on the American flag and the Pledge of Allegiance to 155 students and gave them small flags. Home schooled deaf students were taught the Pledge and the National Anthem with sign language. The book *I'm Your Flag, So Please Treat Me Right* by Julia Cook was read to students by two units, with one presenting the book to the school. Another unit donated books to the public library but the amount wasn't specified. Three flags were donated to three new classrooms. One unit donated 75 Box Tops for Education with a value of \$50 and five ink cartridges. Mittens were collected and donated to the Food Shelf.

Give Ten to Education tracking sheets were sent by two units that totaled 320 items worth \$553; others reported in items given in their narrative so a total of seven schools received supplies valued at \$1378. A suggestion was made at a Christian Women's Luncheon to donate items for teachers to give to students; they were very generous. A 'Certificate of Participation for Give Ten' was found online and given to their chair.

Eighteen veterans from one post went to three schools and three nursing homes near Veterans Day. Another unit observed Veterans Day with a school-wide assembly. The seniors pinned flowers on the veterans, the band played, the kindergarten led saying the Pledge and received small flags, the third grade sang, and two Quilts of

Valor were presented. Students gave back by making over 200 holiday cards for active/reserve military and the unit sent them with gift cards.

National Education Week was observed Nov. 13-17th. Nine units treated 54 schools for a total of \$887. Most often apples and goodie baskets or bags with a thank you were presented to teachers, staff, bus drivers, though one unit treated the staff and bus drivers at 21 schools with 1400 granola bars (much lighter than apples). One unit included the Americanism Essay Contest cover sheet with their baskets. Sandwiches were made for P-T Conferences and food was prepared for workers building a new school.

Please join me in prayer for their families.

While this is overwhelmingly sad news, I am very proud to report some of the events and activities reported from 9 of our 46 Units. There were 4 Units that applied for the Lemke Memorial Plaque.

All the Units Reporting showed their Chaplain's offer the Opening and Closing prayer at meetings.

Send out cards to members and families that are ill hospitalized and families of deceased. Some Units have done the memorial service or celebration of life for members that have passed. They will present Poppies with a service at the time of the Memorial Service.

Several Units offer various dollar amounts given with Sympathy Cards sent to a family member. One Unit also sends money to members who have been hospitalized.

Some Units noted information shared with the Unit Historian to update the Unit Historical Books. There is also a Service in Units for Draping the Charter for those that have passed away, the black drape will remain on the Charter or the Members Photo for 90 days. It was interesting to see that most Units have a special Memorial Service in May to honor those that have passed from their Units each year. Some will drape their Charters during that time for up to a month and post the list of those that passed.

The First Sunday in February – several Units also presented the Story of the 4 Chaplains (the story of the Chapel).

Flags and Wreaths are taken to the Cemeteries for Memorial Day and Christmas and other holidays throughout the year– some will also toss a wreath in the lake or river to honor those lost at sea.

It was noted that Graveside Markers and Flags were purchased or replaced at over 60 deceased Veterans and or spouses as well as Auxiliary Members.

As the 3rd District Chaplain, it was my pleasure to provide prayer for all the district meetings and events throughout the year. Also, some history and prayers for the 3rd District monthly newsletters' for a special project, I put together a prayerbook for the District President for the 2023 -2024 year that included words of wisdom, prayers and poems from the District Units and Department of MN District Presidents. My hope is this gift will allow her to remember and reflect on the wonderful year she has given of her time.

This is just a sample of the many ways the Chaplains are working in the 3rd District. Congratulations and thank you for all you do.

Children and Youth 3rd District Year End Report 2023-2024 Betty Schlueter, Chair

There are 46 units in the Third district. Only 18 Units submitted year end reports to me. The number was very low, but the reports I did receive were wonderful. Legislation 3rd District Year End Report 2023-2024 Michelle Leonard, Chair

The American Legion Auxiliary's Legislation program is, at its core, an effort to affect change for the betterment and security of veterans, active military, and their families through outreach to elected officials at the local, state and federal levels.

For the year 2023-2024, 15 of the Third District's 46 units submitted reports for Legislation. Of those to participate in the program:

- 7 units visited the American Legion's Legislative website to keep current on legislative priorities.
- 6 unit members indicated they are subscribed to the American Legion's legislative action alerts
- 3 units downloaded and reviewed the American Legion Auxiliary Advocacy Guide

The 2024 Veterans Day on the Hill was scheduled after the deadline for submitting annual reports, so participation in that event is an estimate, only. Three units indicated they planned to send a cumulative of eight Third District members to 2024 Veterans Day on the Hill.

Units to participate in the Legislation program contacted a total of one city council member, one county commissioner, five state legislators, and five members of Congress. Outreach was conducted through three phone calls, six emails, two letters, and three in-person meetings. Five units indicated they heard back from their representatives.

Two units reported planning events to educate members in January as part of Legislation month. In both class,

the unit chairmen shared the American Legion's legislative priorities with members. Units rightly noted that 2024 is a biennium year at the Minnesota State Legislature; therefore, this year's requests have been policy-driven in nature, as it is not a budget year. Nonetheless, one unit chairman shared contact information for their area's legislators with members, and another unit cited efforts to research bills and policies that affect veterans, active military, and their families at a state and federal level.

There is no Third District award for this program. Thank you to all unit chairmen who submitted reports for Legislation.

ARMED FORCES SERVICE CENTER 3RD District Year End Report 2023 - 2024 Lois Wenz, Chairman

The Armed Forces Service Center (AFSC) at the Minneapolis/St. Paul Airport is top-rated with dedicated volunteers serving those who served. Military personnel who may use the Center include Traveling Active Duty, National Guard Reserve, Retirees, Purple Heart and Medal of Honor recipients, former POW, Dependents and Department of Defense. This wonderful center was founded on November 22, 1970 by a mother Maggie Purdum after her son died in Vietnam.

Five Units reported. Two Units donated \$300 each and two units donated \$100 each totaling \$800. Other Units may have only reported under the National Security Program.

Information was received from one Unit who has a member volunteering at the AFSC for the past several years serving several four-hour shifts each month. It's great to know that a Unit and our District has a volunteer. We extend our Thanks to you for being a volunteer! She states and reminds us that since the Center opened November 22, 1970, over one million active-duty military personnel dependents and retirees have passed through the AFSC. From October 2006 the AFSC "Troop Greeters" have welcomed more than 334 military charter flights (over 89,000 combat troops) and over 1,110 military charter buses (around 46,000 troops). If any ALA members are seeking a place to volunteer, she and this Chairman highly recommend contacting AFSC at www.mnafsc.or/volunteer-ii.

One Unit involved 12 volunteers to make and donate 12 children's activity bags valued at \$20 each. Shopping and delivery totaled 30 hours with 175 mileage to MSP Airport.

One Unit encouraged members to wear Red on Fridays – Remember Everyone Deployed.

12,681 hours were volunteered helping and serving veterans around the Third District and beyond. A total of \$50,904 were spent on events programs dinners that were provide for veteran. About \$9225. was given in "Inkind" donations. They were taken to VA Medical Center, hospitals, homes, and Veterans affiliated programs.

Units reported that it was too hard to judge how many veterans were served and did fill out this portion.

Units did report that 245 veterans participated in school programs, on veterans' day, educational awareness and they presented scholarships to students.

Total donations for The Department of MN sponsored programs were \$9543.

The units that sent an essay reported providing Poppy Flowers to veterans. They also said they were used to decorate post homes, in letters to veterans and used for Remembrance Day for individual funerals.

Our district units love to help Hastings Veterans Home. They provide entertainment for the residence. These events are bingo with prizes, BBQ rib dinners, and steak dinners. Our Auxiliary sent gifts for the adopt a vet program for birthdays and holidays.

Public Relation 3rd District Year End Report 2023-2024 Ginny Schuelke, Chair

Public Relations is critical to promoting the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary. Everything ALA members promote, publish and post should be tied to our mission.

The mission of the American Legion Auxiliary is to support the American Legion and to honor the sacrifice of those who serve, enhancing the lives of our veterans, military, and their families, both at home and abroad. For God and Country, we advocate for Veterans, educate our citizens, mentor youth, and promote

patriotism, good citizenship, peace, and security.

Annual reports were received from 19 units in our district. Our units used a variety of resources to promote our mission. These resources included unit newsletters, e-bulletins, Social Media pages and websites. Additionally, units worked with their local newspapers and radio stations to share information regarding activities and events occurring within the community.

Seven of our units have a website, of those seven three are a joint website with the post. There is one unit that is currently working with the post to create a website. Of the units that completed annual reports, six units send out a newsletter to their members and three units utilize e-bulletins. Eight of our units have a Facebook page; of those eight, two units are new to Facebook this year. In addition to Facebook, one unit also uses Instagram. Twelve of the units reported that they worked with their local newspapers to submit articles, meeting notices and activity flyers. The number of articles submitted by unit ranged from 1 to 15. One of the units reported that they were on the local TV station and three units utilized the local radio station.

The ALA National Website offers a variety of items to assist in the area of Public Relations. Seven of the units reported that they accessed the National Website to assist with promoting our mission.

In regard to branding, many of our units participated in local community activities which included local parades and festivals, Easter Hunts, Halloween Activities and other community events. While participating, they wear Auxiliary T-Shirts, Emblems, etc. to build the image and raise awareness of our organization. Additionally, members attend the Memorial Day Service and Funerals in uniform. Several units presented Good Deed Awards and one unit invited the Mayor to participate in the presentation, another unit held an Open House.

Of the reporting units, 133.5 volunteer hours were reported and \$640 were spent.

Constitution/By-Laws and Standing Rules Parliamentarian and Constitution/By-Laws and Standing Rules 2023/2024 Chairman Barbara Klehr

Every unit, everywhere, needs to be aware of the changes that are happening and revise their documents accordingly to match National's Constitution and By-Laws! It does take time, but units need to understand that it is one of the most important things they will do for their unit. The ALA's eligibility includes spouses, so make sure your wording has been updated. If the section is referencing general membership, consider swapping out "she" and replacing with

the neutral term "member(s)." If the section refers to the duties of a specific office — for example, the unit president — consider changing "she" to "the president." Instead of saying "she shall preside over unit meetings," change the text to "the unit president shall preside over all unit meetings." The American Legion eliminated great-granddaughters. Does your unit's Standing Rules reflect all the new changes?

Your governing documents state the fundamentals of your unit. These rules and procedures should be as clear as possible. Did your unit raise its dues, will it be raising it next year? Does your Standing Rules state what your dues are? They must. The three things your unit's Standing Rules must declare are what your dues are set at, when you hold your meetings and where. Anything else you add is operational information for new members on how your unit functions. My unit has chartered a boy scout troop since its inception. They turned in their charter this year. We had to remove that from our Standing Rules. Think of it as spring cleaning or fall cleaning, whenever you go over your Standing Rules, but you need to do it to keep up with all the changes.

One thing that continues to be true is that old saying: "If you stay ready, you won't have to get ready." That simply means spring/fall cleaning can be greatly lessened by staying on top of your closets and your governing documents. Take the time after each unit meeting to update any changes voted on by your unit. Assign segments of your Standing Rules to be reviewed by members of your unit. Have them check for accuracy, clarity, and specificity. If there is room for interpretation, consider rewriting the section with clearer, stronger language. If you do it on a regular basis, it won't take a whole meeting to do it.

There will be five resolutions and six recommendations that will be brought up at the District Executive Committee meeting before the Convention. Those that are passed by the Executive Committee will be brought to the floor for a vote. You are the members of this organization. You get to decide. Organizational governing documents are so important because they state the fundamental purpose, structure, and limits of an organization, as well as containing the procedures the organization must follow to conduct business effectively and efficiently. Up to date, well-written, clear, and concise governing documents help to clarify authorities, outline responsibilities, and can ultimately serve to solve issues before they become problems. Your governing documents matter, so this spring/fall while you work to get your house in order, consider doing the same for your governing documents.

This committee doesn't have any awards or commendations, but we are still vital and need your information. I received one annual report. One (frown), other than my own unit. My email contact is in the District Newsletter. Let's try harder this next working year. Every Unit is unique in what they wish to promote. And that should be in your Standing Rules. If you have a small unit, you can't possibly do everything. You can post those programs in your Standing Rules that you wish to really push. If you can't meet every month, list in your Standing Rules the months, day and time you do meet. These are YOUR Standing Rules and your members need to know those rules.

There are 46 units in the 3rd District and 15 reports were received for the Past Presidents Parley. Of the 15 reports received 2 units did not participate, 6 units do not have a Past Pres Parley but 4 of those units sent in a report which stated how their unit Past Presidents participated in activities. There were 7 units reporting that have an active Past Presidents Parley.

The units hold an annual meeting and go over their Past Presidents Parley Standing Rules and collect dues and fines, they discuss activities they will provide throughout the year such as cards, letters and gifts for our female veterans, scholarships, recognition of our first responders and veterans, and speakers for auxiliary luncheons and programs. They team up the Past Presidents with newer members to actively mentor the newer members.

The units reported they are recognizing female Veterans by sending birthday cards, Christmas gifts, Valentine Day cards, donating to Eagles Healing nest and Sauk Center Lady Liberty dorms and paying Auxiliary dues. One unit has a banner program called "Hometown Heros" where a 5' tall banner is displayed with the hero's photo, name, and rank along Highway 60 for 6 months where they honored several women veterans. They also donated to the Department Past Presidents Health Care scholarship fund with some of the donations in honor of deceased members.

For Women's History month, one unit wrote articles that were published in the local newspaper about a 99-year-old WWII Army nurse, a 60-year member of the Auxiliary, and using the scrapbook a recently deceased Unit Past President from 1977-1978 who had been a member for 49 years.

Donations were made to McCleod County Yellow Ribbon. The past Presidents helped with Essay judging for unit awards, membership renewal, maintaining white crosses for the Memorial Day, helping to distribute poppies, and filling out year-end reports.

Two units supported the musical "Hello Girls" based on a true story about women in WWI who went to the front lines as telephone operators.

The 3rd District Past President held their annual Past Presidents Parley meeting on October 7, 2023, in Shakopee. There were 11 Past Presidents in attendance, and one guest, 3rd District President Deanna. We held our business meeting, and everyone brought a dish to share for lunch. We donated to the Department Past Presidents Health Care scholarship fund in honor of 3rd District Past President Marcie Schmidt.

AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY 3RD DISTRICT HISTORY REPORT

We have 46 Units in District 3. I received reports from 13 Units. The Unit Annual reports form for the year were not sent to units this year.

Americanism: Kindergarten students that had memorized the Pledge of Allegiance were given flags and led the pledge on Veteran's Day. The Pledge of Allegiance is recited at Unit meetings and a small flag set on the POW/MIA table

at dinners. Small American Flags are carried while members march along parade routes. For Memorial Day, American spirit is shown by helping their Legion post with their services and attending grave sites and marking graves with flags. Members attended Flag Disposal Ceremonies. A History of the American Flag was given with several authentic flags with a history of each one.

Auxiliary Emergency Fund: Donations were made to Silent Auctions and by collections at meetings. Three members made personal donations of \$100 each and received the "new" gold pin. The gambling Fund donated \$200.

Children and Youth: 18.2 pounds of pop can tabs were collected for the Ronald McDonald House. Over 7,000 eggs were hidden for Easter Hunts. In preparation for the event 155 hours were completed by 55 volunteers. Donations by Units were Outstanding Girl Citizen Award \$200, Outstanding Girl Citizen (grade 12) \$200 plus a U.S. Flag. \$50 donation to the Post Prom Party, \$50 to local Library for their Summer Reading Program. May Easter baskets were given to children of active military. Halloween parties were held for local children. 284 children in grades 3,4,5, and 6 participated in a flag poster contests. Donations of \$30 were made to the local "Friends of the Library" program. Donations to Child Welfare \$175 was given for National Family Night out. Over 200 holiday cards were made by elementary students for active servicemen and women. Total volunteer hours by Auxiliary members were 82 hours plus over 500 hours by the students through participating, total cost \$480. Ten National Good Deed Awards were given.

Community Service: Units worked at the food shelf, Bake sales, Bingo and meat sales, made pillows and quilts for veterans and the homeless, Cash donations were given to the food shelf, library, Annual Night out, Meals on Wheels, host potluck lunch following Memorial Day service and invited community members to attend \$2,825 spent, Red Cross Blood Mobile (184 hours and \$150 for meals). 225 hours for community Thanksgiving Dinner and assisted with the Post at their monthly breakfast. Total volunteer hours were 2,089. Total dollars spent \$3,200. Donations made by Units: Bountiful Basket Food Shelf \$197, Library Summer Reading Program \$291, Christmas in May \$291, Launch Ministry for homeless youth \$500 and Tree House youth \$291. Total donated hours were 5,281.

Constitution and Standing Rules: Parliamentarian serves as Chair. Units recites the Preamble to the American Legion Auxiliary at each meeting. Standing rules are reviewed and updated annually. Copies are mailed to Department Office. District Parliamentarian, and District Secretary.

Education: Donation of \$150 of clothing. Members helped local schools by collecting manufacturer's coupon/UPC labels to support schools, valued over \$100. An Outstanding Good Citizen Award of \$200 plus a USA flag was given. During Education Week, baskets that included Thank You Notes, prepackaged cookies, apples, small USA flags, and poppy bookmarkers were given at schools, School Bus Office, and Library. \$1,550

for scholarships were given to school seniors. In addition, auxiliary members gave \$650 in scholarships. One unit donated \$25 to the MN Department Scholarship Fund. \$440 was collected to the Give Ten to Education Program.

Finance: The treasurers keep their books up to date. The required forms are submitted to the 3rd District and Department for membership, convention registration, per capita dues, and membership. Also submitted were the proper forms for contributions for designated donations that are sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of Minnesota. The units file a 990n report each year. All receipts and disbursements are reported to the membership in writing at their regular meetings.

Girl State: Seven representatives were sent to Girl State from 5 Units. The girls were given \$25 or \$50 each, and one unit also gave each an American Flag pin and a small American Flag. They talked about their experience with slides at future meetings. One Unit keeps a record of all past attendees. This list is shared with perspective attendees each February during the Units presentation at the high school. On occasion some girl will find the name of her mother, grandmother, aunt, or sister. To Posts donated a total of \$1,500.

History: Historians, along with Unit members, collected articles, pictures, programs, minutes, financial records, etc. for their Unit scrapbook. Annual reports are kept on file. New and renewed members received a copy of Unit History. Several Auxiliary members volunteer at local Historical locations. Unit historians keep scrapbooks of the year's activities.

Leadership: The many things that the Units accomplished this year could not have been done without team effort. Leaders chaired major events that the Units were holding. Units praised their President and the efforts of many members for the accomplishments. Older members mentor newer members on all their projects. Members attended Department Leadership workshops. Members completed courses with the American Legion Auxiliary Academy. Secretaries emailed monthly minutes, District newsletters, Departmental, or National programs. Speakers attended meetings and spoke on information related to community activities and veterans' needs. Units recognized how important Branding is and ordered new ALA logo vests, shirts, and name tags.

Legislation: Members were encouraged to attend Minnesota Veterans Day on the Hill at the State Capitol. Members subscribed and/or viewed the Dispatch online. Members subscribed and/or viewed the Minnesota Session Weekly or Senate Briefly. Units contacted their US Senator, US Representative, and local Council members by letters, phone calls, emails, and personal contact. Members encouraged everyone to vote. County VSOs were contacted regarding veterans' issues. Members serve as election judges. One Legislation Chairman kept a 156-page scrapbook and reported on current issues at meetings.

Membership: Cooperation with Legion Membership Chair helps one Unit get new members. When the Legion gets a new member, they are willing to provide them with information that there might be a possible spouse, daughter, mother, or grandmother that is eligible to join. Members are recognized for their continuous years of membership with certificates and pins. Letters were mailed to new members and renewing members, along with a benefit sheet and their membership card. Units raised dues because National is raising dues \$6 for 2024. Initiation Ceremonies were held for new members.

Memorial: The opening and closing ceremonies of Unit meetings and Executive Committee meetings always include a prayer. Sympathy, get well, and thinking of you cards are sent to Unit members. Members are also remembered with phone calls and visits when hospitalized or loss of a loved one. During the Coronavirus quarantine, members are phoned for wellness checks and encouragement. Memorial services for deceased members are held in May. Units raised money to build Veteran's Memorials. The POW-MIA are remembered. During the Auxiliary year, draping and undraping of the Charter is conducted for deceased senior members.

National Security: Units initiated the "Remember Everyone Deployed" Program from 2017. Members wear red on Fridays and are encouraged to wear Purple during April in honor of Military Children Month. Gold Star Mothers are honored on September 28th in honor of Gold Star Mother's Day. One Auxiliary member attended

a Military Packing project where 170 boxes were filled with treats for the Service People. POW/MIA Empty Table ceremonies were held at Unit meeting and special functions. Care packages were sent from several.

Units. Over 60,000 coupons were clipped and sent to military bases abroad. \$1,000 was donated to the Armed Forces Service Center inside the MSP airport.

Past President Parley: Past Presidents shared highlights during their tenure. They were recorded and displayed at the unit. The fiscal reporting year for the 3rd District runs from August 1st through July 31st after which time an Audit will take place and the results will be published in the September Newsletter.

For the 2024 membership year the 3rd District Standing Rules state that the Per-Capita is \$2.00 per member. Each year the membership keeps going down and if we hope to keep the Per-capita at \$2.00 I am asking each unit to concentrate on bringing in new members to maintain or increase the Unit membership and the membership of the District. As of April 10^{th,} the 3rd District membership is down 389 members from last year's total which at \$2.00 per member is \$778.00. I know the membership number will come up between now and July 31st, but this is food for thought.

This year it is estimated the District will spend approximately \$7400.00. The per-capita was \$6986.00, this puts the District about \$400.00 over what was brought in. The 3rd District had \$1346.96 left from 2023 so we are still ahead financially, and we do have \$8000.00 in the savings account that will hold us for a little while, but if we maintain or increase the membership that will keep us ahead. If we do not maintain or increase the membership, we will be looking at a Per-Capita dues raise in the near future.
